




ARIZONA STATE COURTS

Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Appeals, and of the Superior Court in Maricopa, Pima, Coconino, and Pinal counties are appointed to office by the governor upon recommendation of a bipartisan commission. The term of office of a Supreme or an Appellate Court judge is six years and of a Superior Court judge four years. At the expiration of their terms, appointed judges wishing to remain in office have their names placed upon the ballot. The electorate then votes to retain or reject them

Arizona Active Management Areas







WHO CAN REGISTER TO VOTE?

- To register to vote in any Arizona county, you must be a U.S. citizen, 18 or older by the next General Election, and a resident within the county at least 29 days prior to the General Election.
- You cannot register to vote in Arizona if you have been convicted of a felony or treason, or if you have not had your rights restored. For assistance call the Public Defender's Office at 520-724-6800.
- If a judge has ruled that a person is incapacitated and their voting rights revoked, they cannot register to vote. (A.R.S. 14-5101)

HOW DO YOU REGISTER TO VOTE?

- You can register to vote or update your voter's registration when you apply for you Arizona driver's license
- If you have an Arizona Driver's License, Non-operating License (Arizona ID) or a Tribal ID Number, you can register and update your information at ServiceArizona.com.
- Voter's registration Forms are also available at post offices, libraries and online at the Pima County Recorder's Office: https://www.recorder.pima.gov/
- If you are a university or college students, you have a right to register to vote at the address you consider the place where you live, whether that is your family's home or the place where you attend school. You should update your registration anytime this home address changes. You may only be registered and vote in one location.

OTHER RULES ABOUT REGISTERING TO VOTE

- You can register at any time, but it must be 29 days before an election if you plant to vote.
- You must update your registration if you change your name, address (even apartment number), or political party. You can do this online at the Pima County Recorder's office: https:// www.recorder.pima.gov/. You can also ask the Arizona Motor Vehicle Division to update your voter registration address when you update your driver' license.
- To vote for candidates for state and local offices, and ballot measures, you must provide proof of U.S. citizenship. If you do not provide that proof, you will only be permitted to vote for candidates for U/S. President, U.S. Senate, and U.S. House of Representatives.
- You must prove that you are a U.S. citizen the first time you register to vote in Arizona or if your Arizona voter registration has been canceled. Valid forms of proof of citizenship
 - Arizona driver's license or non-operating license issued after October 1, 1996.

Other acceptable proof of citizenship (only one is needed):

- Legible copy of a birth certificate that verifies citizenship.
 If the name on the birth certificate is not the same as your current legal name, submit supporting documents (e.g. marriage certificate).
- Legible copy of the pertinent pages of your passport

- Presentation to the County Recorder of U.S. naturalization documents, or provide your Alien Registration Number, Naturalization Certificate Number, or Citizenship Certificate Number
- Indian Census Number, Bureau of Indian Affairs Number, Tribal Treaty Card Number, or Tribal Enrollment Number
- Legible copy of your Tribal Certificate of Indian Blood or Tribal or Bureau of Indian Affairs Affidavit of Birth

PRIMARY ELECTIONS INSTRUCTIONS FOR INDEPENDENT VOTERS

Arizona has an Open Primary provision. This means that Independent voters are still eligible to vote in the primaries.

- An Independent Voter can vote in a General Election Primary.
 To do so, they need to request a preferred Political Party ballot. Voting will not change their Independent status.
- An Independent Voter can only vote in a Presidential Preference Election, if they change their voter registration from being an Independent to a specific Political Party.



ABOUT VOTING

In Arizona voters do not need an excuse to vote early or by mail. There are two ways to be added to the Active Early Voting List (AEVL):

- Make a written request to the Pima County Recorder's Office asking to be on the list. https://www.recorder.pima.gov/
- Update your voter registration on Service Arizona and either add or remove yourself from the Active Early Voter List. The link for that is servicearizona.com

While enrolled in the list, you will automatically receive an Early Voting Ballot for every election you are eligible to participate in.

Vote by mail

Completed ballots can be mailed, dropped off at a dropbox, returned to a drop off location, early voting site, or Election Day vote center in your county of residence by no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day. You can find a list of drop off locations on your county's election website. Voters can track their mail ballot by visiting https://my.arizona.vote/PortalList.aspx.

Vote early in person

A voter may cast their ballot at an early voting location site between 27 days before Election Day and the Friday before Election Day. Early voting hours and days vary by county. Contact your county recorder for specific information.

Vote in person on Election Day

Go to any Vote Center on election day. Vote Centers will be open from 6 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Election Day. Curbside voting is available to voters who are unable to enter the Vote Center. Voters can locate Election Day Vote Center at: https://my.arizona.vote/PortalList.aspx. If you are in line by the closing time, then you have a right to vote.

To find forms, check your voter registration, find out where to vote, or get other answers, call your County Recorder's Office or go to their website. In Pima County, call 520-724-4330 or go to recorder.pima.gov.

PROPER ID FOR VOTING ON ELECTION DAY

List #1 - Sufficient Photo ID including name and address (One Required)

- Valid Arizona driver license
- Valid Arizona non-operating identification card
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification

List #2 - Sufficient ID without a photograph that bears the name and address (Two Required)

- Utility bill of the elector that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election. A utility bill may be for electric, gas, water, solid waste, sewer, telephone, cellular phone, or cable television
- Bank or credit union statement that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election
- Valid Arizona Vehicle Registration
- · Indian census card
- Property tax statement of the elector's residence
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Arizona vehicle insurance card
- Recorder's Certificate
- Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification, including a voter registration card issued by the County Recorder
- Any mailing to the elector marked "Official Election Material"

List #3 - Mix & Match from Lists #1 & #2 (Two Required)

- Any valid photo identification from List 1 in which the address does not reasonably match the precinct register accompanied by a non-photo identification from List 2 in which the address does reasonably match the precinct register
- U.S. Passport without address and one valid item from List 2
- U.S. Military identification without address and one valid item from List 2



Taking Action - Your Voice Can Be Heard

Elected officials want to hear from their constituents, and you can communicate in a variety of ways. The Legislature's website (www.azleg.gov) provides each legislator's contact information, committee assignments and other useful information.

- You can meet elected officials in person by attending government meetings, town halls, hearings and public events. You may also request an appointment.
- By phone: Use the official phone number listed for their office.
- By mail or email: On the subject line, identify the name or number of the bill, and your position: in favor or opposed. Put comments/ reasons in the content of the letter. Be brief.
- To record your approval or disapproval (and to comment) on any bill scheduled for committee consideration as part of the public record, register in advance with the Legislature's Request To Speak (RTS) System, which is accessible at www.azleg.gov. For information on registering for your free RTS account contact Cynthia Patchen, cpatchen@azleg.gov, or at 520-398-6000. You will need to go in person to the Arizona State Office building at 416 W. Congress St., downtown Tucson. Call the number above before you visit to confirm office hours.
